### ~ Rider Spotlight ~

#### **Dakota Lynch**

I have the privilege and pleasure of instructing a young man, Dakota, who I have come to know both through PARDS and our previous relationship as coworkers at Goodwill Industries. Dakota has Autism which affects his speech, literacy and comprehension skills. He joined the Therapeutic Riding Program to increase his self-confidence, participate in a recreational activity and give him opportunities for socialization.

Dakota is currently partnered with Risley and, together, they are working toward Dakota's current goal of participating in the Equine Canada Video Competitions. These competitions give riders the opportunity to compete with their peers on a national level with qualified judges scoring the test to determine ranking and offering extensive feedback which is then incorporated into the rider's lesson plans. The specific skill Dakota is working on to help him with this goal is his posting trot. A posting trot

is a riding technique where the rider rises up in the saddle in time with the horse's gait. This makes trotting more comfortable, not so bumpy for the rider and easier on the horse's back. In order to perform a posting trot, Dakota needs to count the beat of the trot and find the rhythm to post in tune with Risley's strides. This takes a lot of coordination on the rider's part and is a great riding goal for Dakota as he has progressed to being able to trot the whole arena.

The social benefits Dakota has realized through his lessons and interactions with his horse and instructor are inspiring. He has developed a deep bond and empathy for his horse partner, always "checking in" with Risley to ensure he is happy and comfortable and even brings him carrots, which

he prepares himself, to feed to Risley at the end of each lesson. Dakota also helps to untack Risley, eagerly anticipating the auditory sensation he experiences from detaching the Velcro fastener on the saddle pad before bringing Risley outside and turning him loose in the big pasture.

Dakota has many great attributes. He is cheerful, helpful, understanding and caring. I am very thankful to be able to support him in building upon these existing traits to become more engaged and active in all aspects of his life.

### ~ Honouring Our Past as We Look Toward Our Fut



There are so many people who have contributed to make the move to our new facility a reality. We recognize and appreciate all those donors and sponsors that specifically supported this project, but we can not truly share our story without remembering that throughout our 33 year history, there are many heroes who made it possible for PARDS to grow into the organization it is today. Without our rich history, we wouldn't be looking toward our bright future.

In 1983, a group of equine enthusiasts and physio therapists heard about a couple of therapeutic riding centres that had started up in the Peace Region. After visiting the facilities and learning more about the practical skills

required to run a program, they determined that they wanted their community of Grande Prairie to create a similar program to support children and adults with disabilities living in the area. In October of 1984, Kay Griffiths, Ruth Finch and Cheryl Kuhn took the lead and developed the organization now known as PARDS.

In those early days, PARDS operated out of 3R Stables, owned by Ed Lightfoot, with volunteers and borrowed horses. Within a few years, PARDS moved to the Tissington farm (now Wedgewood Estates) before moving once again to lease space from Evergreen Park and operate out of the Lewis Hawkes Arena. In 1992, Ed and Terri Haberman made a tremendous gift of 20 acres of land where we could build our very own facility. Chris DeWit provided \$100,000 toward the construction and the remaining funds required were raised through donations and gift-in-kind materials and labour. In January of 1994, the first lesson was offered out of the new PARDS. For over 20 years, our current home has served the community well. From 5 riders at inception, steady growth now sees over 350 therapeutic riders in our arena each year. The Haberman Family continues to support PARDS through providing letters of support and words of encouragement as we enter into our next phase. Their original gift continues to give as well, as we are able to sell the land to help fund our future.

Thank you to all who have supported our very special riders for so many years. Without you, there could be no us. Your generosity lives on through each and every rider, past, present and future, who are able to develop and grow beyond what they ever thought possible because you believed in their potential and the benefits of therapeutic horsemanship.

senses. His rhythmic motion and fun, bouncy trot causes riders to focus on his movement. This can have a particularly calming effect on clients with autism.

#### Why can't horses vomit?

Horses have a number of key physiological differences to ensure that any food they ingest takes only a one-way trip. For example, the muscles of the equine lower esophageal sphincter are much stronger than in other animals, making it nearly impossible to open that valve under backward pressure from the stomach. Also, the equine esophagus joins the stomach at a much lower angle than in many animals, so when the stomach is distended, as with gas, it presses against the valve in such a way that holds it even more tightly closed. And, located deep within the rib cage, the equine stomach cannot be readily squeezed by the abdominal muscles. Finally, horses have a weak vomiting reflex---in other words, the neural pathways that control that activity in other animals are poorly developed in horses, if they exist at all.

So why did horses evolve this way? At some point, the need to retain food in the stomach must have been a more important survival mechanism than the need to eject toxins. Because horses are built to graze---to take in very small portions at a time as they feed throughout the day---and because they are fairly fussy about the plants they browse, it's possible that they never needed to vomit because they would consume toxic doses only rarely.
