Treasurer's Report

Where Do the Funds Come From?

Where Do the Funds Go?



At the start of 2022 there were still some lingering pressures of COVID-19 being felt by PARDS management and staff and focus was on providing herd care and quality lessons. This provided similar challenges in the beginning of the year as the previous two years, but as COVID-19 restrictions lessened and business started to return to pre-pandemic levels it brought forth a renewed sense of purpose to everyone at PARDS. The region we serve is full of compassionate and generous individuals and companies who believe in the value of the programs and supports PARDS offers to those of all skills and abilities. This year there was an increase of 4% in Grants and Donations and an additional increase of 4% in Fundraising Events, Partnerships and Gaming. PARDS hosted our Carnival where the winner of our Side of Beef Raffle (donated by JDA) was announced, and the Dine and Dance fundraiser in November. Both events were well attended and received positive feedback from the community. PARDS was also successful in securing grants and donations specific to funding our programs.

Facility Expenses included facility capital expenses with the construction of a 3 bay garage and a hay & shavings storage shed; PARDS received \$60,000 through the County's Major Capital Projects Grant and \$169,000 through the Rotary Club of Grande Prairie to facilitate the project. PARDS also received a donation of \$15,000 from CNRL for the hay shed project in addition to their "Day of Service" on May 18th. PARDS also received a grant for the purchase price and installation of a new ceiling mounted sling lift from the Swan City Rotary Club as our old one broke and, due to its age, parts were no longer available to repair.

Slim Allen Award of Excellence

Slim was one of the founding members of PARDS and stayed connected with us in some form throughout our history. Before Slim passed away, he reached out to PARDS with the idea of the award which he wanted to be presented to someone that made an exceptional contribution to PARDS in any capacity. Over the years, we have had the honour of presenting the award to riders, volunteers, long-time advocates and even staff members. Slim's life and legacy reflects his belief that horses are healing and that everyone deserves an opportunity to be active and engaged in whatever they are passionate about. PARDS was so fortunate to have had Slim as a foundational member of our organization.



Nancy Ingram has been a long time PARDS volunteer, who started her journey with PARDS back at our old facility. She has been immeasurably generous in our lessons with her time and the support that she has shared with our riders and their different needs.

Nancy stepped up to help us develop some programs, utilizing her experience and expertise as a retired schoolteacher. This past spring we worked with the Aboriginal Head Start Program through the Grande Prairie Friendship Centre. Nancy took on a lead role running the Critter Connections portion of that program, working with the kids and developing their literacy

skills. She developed worksheets and resources at home, always bringing new and refreshing ideas to the team.

Nancy doesn't do anything halfway, she always goes above and beyond. When Nancy commits to something, she does it all the way and we know we can rely on her without fail. When we find ourselves short handed and need a volunteer to cover a role in lessons, she is usually the first one offering to help. At our events we see her offering her time applying glitter tattoos and she even donates the supplies, knowing how much the children enjoy them.

When we think of Nancy and what it means to embody the spirit of PARDS as a volunteer, we know she is more than deserving of the Slim Allen Award of Excellence.



Therapeutic Cart Driving Program

In the fall of 2001, at the age of 12, Michelle began her journey with PARDS. At the time, Michelle was in grade 7 and one of her teachers discovered PARDS and thought the programs offered may interest her and be a fun and rewarding experience. At the age of 2, Michelle was diagnosed with Multiple Specific Disability Syndrome which is defined as two or more disabling conditions that affect learning and other important life functions. Michelle has continued to participate for many years and, over her time here, she has ridden many horses, but she shared that Scout stands out in her memory as her favourite. She fondly remembers her trusty partner that she cared so enthusiastically and compassionately for.

Since first joining the program, Michelle, now 34, has moved into our cart driving program and has had much success. She very quickly began driving independently and took to it as well as she did to riding, giving her a new equine and learning experience at PARDS.

During the shutdown of the pandemic, having taken such a long break, Michelle lost a little confidence in her driving ability, but she did not let that stop her. When lessons resumed, she signed up right away as she missed coming to the barn each week. She got to work regaining that confidence and getting her driving back to the level



she had been at, which took her no time at all. Michelle then looked forward to learning more. Currently her lessons are focused on her goals of driving patterns and improving her driving skills, which can help her personal goals of maintaining focus, improving memory and following instructions.

Her pony partner currently is Frodo, who just so happens to be one of her two favourite ponies, the other being Tori. Michelle is working with Frodo, doing arena figures and patterns at a trot and keeping that trot consistent and forward without breaking stride. Michelle has long term goals of taking the arena figures she is learning and working her way up to driving a full Para Dressage test.

Michelle also has interest in some barn activities and has expressed a goal of hitching and unhitching her own pony to the cart. She has recently started to learn where all the buckles are located, and in which order they need to be undone when unhitching Frodo. There is a lot to the cart and Michelle not only enjoys learning about it, but she is learning and retaining the information quickly and is a great assistant as she works her way to doing it independently.

Michelle always has a smile on her face and her infectious laugh is loved by all. We look forward to many more years of supporting Michelle in her goals.

Little Pony Motricity Inclusive Preschool Program

PARDS was excited to have 27 children between the ages of 3 and 5 from the Grande Prairie Friendship Centre join us for 10 weeks in our Little Pony Motricity Program. Each week, through fun activities, they learned about safety and basic leading and riding skills. They learned about horse care, grooming, picking hooves as well as enjoying the learning and engagement of the literacy focused activities with the critters. We can't thank retired kindergarten teacher Nancy Ingram enough for helping to create the fun, interactive literacy part of the day. The Head Start Program's philosophy is "Every child has the right to develop his or her full potential as a spiritual, emotional, social, and physical being. Our program thrives to instill a sense of pride and a desire to learn, provide parenting skills, foster emotional and social development, increase confidence, and improve family relationships." PARDS is honoured they chose to include our program as a support of their program objectives.









Therapeutic Riding Program

Reeghan Funk

Reeghan began riding with PARDS in 2009 at the age of 3 years old in the Therapeutic Riding program to help her build balance and strength. Reeghan has a diagnosis of Cerebral Palsy which, for her, results in limited muscle control and weakness, especially in her lower extremities, lack of coordination and a paralyzed vocal chord which impacts the volume of her speech. She came to ride at PARDS for the physical benefits of increasing her strength and fine & gross motor skills as well as to provide an activity where she would feel safe, enjoy herself and be fully engaged.

I first met Reeghan over 10 years ago as a bright, ambitious little girl with a huge smile that would light up a room. Her initial physical goal was to strengthen her core and her first riding goal was to use her reins with a long term goal of one day riding independently. Reeghan's mom shared that doctors had told the family that Reeghan likely would never be able to sit up on her own so that became the first goal. To help her achieve this, her lessons consisted of having her mounted on her horse, holding herself up and slowly improving her strength, balance and coordination. When she began riding, Reeghan had the support of a leader and two sidewalkers in her lessons.

Early on, Reeghan was introduced to the Para Equestrian Video Competitions where she has flourished over the years earning many ribbons and benefitting from the comments of the judges. Over the many years Reeghan has competed, she and her instructors have incorporated the feedback and suggestions from the judges into her weekly lessons.

These many years later, Reeghan continues to excel. In pursuit of her long-term goal of riding independently, Reeghan pushes herself to work through challenges and fatigue and is currently riding patterns without a leader. We continue to provide sidewalker support with a volunteer leader nearby able to hook on to Cowboy, Reeghan's horse partner, in the event it becomes necessary.

Reeghan has partnered with many PARDS program horses over the years and, together, they have always progressed and she has learned something from each of them. Reeghan has shared that her "heart horse" was Gertie who she partnered with early in her equestrian journey. Currently, Reeghan is partnered with Cowboy which has proven to be a great match. The bond between Reeghan and Cowboy is incredible, he is such a gentleman and takes care of Reeghan every step of the way.

I am very happy to have reconnected with Reeghan after I returned to PARDS, not only as her current instructor, but also as a true fan of her aspirations, dedication and determination. Reeghan is a true inspiration to everyone she meets and we look forward to continuing her journey at PARDS.


Ptit Trot Program

Penelope began riding in the P'tit Trot program at the age of 6, with the help of a horse leader and her trusty



Can't wait to see how far she gets in her riding skills this year!

After being in lessons for a while, Penelope decided she wanted to volunteer. Penelope and her mom came to the Volunteer Orientation and the two have since been volunteering in the barn. They clean stalls and sweep up the alleyways the day of Penelope's lesson and her mom has filled in leading when another volunteer can't be there. We can't thank them enough for their help.

Youth Leadership Program

Aaron is a 12 year old boy struggling to find his place within his social circle as well as his family circle. Aaron has been raised by his mom with very little interaction with his dad throughout his life. His mom has multiple medical issues including blindness and, as a result, Aaron has developed the belief that he needs to be the caregiver and he is behaving selfishly when he doesn't "feel like it" or is feeling overwhelmed by the role.

Aaron's grandma and grandpa are very involved in his and his mom's lives and are a major support to the family. Grandma recognized that he was withdrawing and seemed to be experiencing behavioral changes outside of what she considered normal for the transition into adolescence. After numerous conversations and observations, grandma realized that he has been struggling for the last several months with bullying and teasing. After attempting to access supports for Aaron through school and the medical system without satisfaction, she brought Aaron to PARDS to look around and meet some horses along with some of the people that work here.

Aaron decided he was comfortable and willing to sign up for the Youth Leadership program. His goal in the program was to learn to deal with his feelings when he was being picked on and maybe to even learn how to get out of the situation when it occurred. Aaron was extremely engaged in the lessons that included "Basement & Balcony Friends" where participants learn, with the help of their horse partners, to recognize traits that can help them see if an individual will pull them down into negative thinking/talk, defiant behavior, risky behavior, etc. or if they are someone that can be relied on, respectful of others, engaged in the world around them, and be a good friend overall. Before learning these concepts and skills, Aaron thought his only option was to latch on to anyone that paid him any attention.

Although Aaron shared that he enjoyed the horses and activities overall, becoming aware that he had even some control over choosing who he wanted to associate with and learning strategies to both pursue a friendship as well as avoid or end one had the most immediate positive impact on him.

Aaron's grandma sent the following note to us after Aaron moved from the area and was no longer able to attend the program.

"Hi, I just wanted to say thanks from my grandson for the opportunity to participate in your Leadership program, he thoroughly enjoyed it.

He missed a few days due to illness and then they moved to St Albert so he was unable to say goodbye or express his gratitude.

It is an excellent program, one which I was hesitant to put him in because he had expressed a fear of horses in the past, but from his first day he loved it and said he wanted to move to a farm.

Please pass on our gratitude to the people involved for making the experience such a memorable one!

Grooming Program

Boyd is a valued participant in our Therapeutic Grooming Program. Boyd originally enrolled in our Therapeutic Cart Driving Program in 2018, but experienced a number of health related issues resulting in an interruption in his participation. In 2022, Boyd was diagnosed with dementia and in an effort to seek out engaging opportunities and fun activities, his caregiver inquired if there might be a way for Boyd to get involved with PARDS again. It was determined the Therapeutic Grooming Program would be a great fit for Boyd.

When Boyd first returned to PARDS he was a bit apprehensive and reluctant to leave the people he knows best, but, within weeks, he began greeting everyone he met when he came to PARDS. Nothing gives Boyd more joy than having someone

address him by name whether or not he knows who they are. His face lights up and he quickly approaches them for a hug.

As with all PARDS programs, the activities are designed around the goals and interests of the participant, and in Boyd's case, this meant the focus would be on keeping him interested and give him opportunities to do things he remembers doing as a child and

young man. His program consists of a variety of activities; grooming, leading the horse around the arena following simple directions and getting outside when the weather allows, looking around as we walk, and talking about what he sees. The program keeps Boyd engaged and fully participating in horse partnership activities, giving him periods of time where he is not worried about where he is, when he is going to bed, or when his family is coming to see him.

Coming to PARDS and having the interaction with staff and his equine partners gives him a valuable break from

his increasing state of anxiousness. His caregiving team is doing all they can to give him as many quality activities as possible in the present. One of his caregivers shared that his symptoms are rapidly progressing and it won't be long before he will possibly forget how to walk. They went on to express that when this happens, they are so appreciative that he will still be able to enjoy his participation in the programs at PARDS.



It is bittersweet to recognize that many of our participants will not experience recovery from their diagnosis and we are all so honoured to be part of their journey, providing experiences that contribute to their happiness and quality of life.

PARDS Therapeutic Programs

Each client that comes to PARDS first goes through an assessment process. We establish goals, go over any other therapy they may be undergoing, establish the physical, emotional or cognitive challenges and work out which horse would be best suited. If it turns out that a client shouldn't ride for health reasons, we work diligently to find an alternative program.

Therapeutic Riding

Therapeutic riding is offered to clients aged 3 and up. Clients who participate in riding lessons must have a clinical diagnosis. Our therapeutic client base encompasses a wide spectrum of disabilities classified under the scope of Physical (includes riders with limited mobility, delayed fine and gross motor skills, low trunk control/core strength, undeveloped balance, etc.), Cognitive (includes riders with limited cognitive capacity, autism spectrum disorders, traumatic brain injury, etc.), Sensory (includes riders with visual, auditory or speech impairment) and Nonvisible (includes riders with learning disability, epilepsy/seizure disorder, ADD/ADHD, anxiety, a variety of psychological disorders, etc.).



Therapeutic Cart Driving

Not everyone can ride – or wants to – but cart driving is another excellent way to access the benefits of equine therapy. Learning to work with and control a horse as the driver of a cart brings many therapeutic benefits, similar to the ones for therapeutic riding. Cart driving is where a horse or pony is hitched to a wheeled cart and is driven around an arena, an obstacle course, or out on a trail. Driving is a fabulous opportunity to make new friends, gain a sense of independence, be out in the open air (weather permitting) and have fun! Cart driving can range from a relaxing ride around our indoor arena or out on our specially designated cart trail, to thrilling PARA Equestrian competitions run by Equine Canada.



Therapeutic Grooming


We offer several programs to clients who cannot take part in horseback riding due to a disability that has a contraindication to riding of any sort. They are also offered to clients who are looking for a different or additional challenge. Grooming offers participants the chance to develop a relationship with a horse, learn horse care skills and benefit physically, psychologically and educationally. The benefits are actually quite similar to those of therapeutic riding with the most important being the positive impacts of the human/animal bond.



Youth Leadership

Youth Leadership is a ground work experiential learning program focusing on cooperation, relationship building, self-esteem and more. It's learning, without realizing you're learning.

- The client works directly with a horse partner and a volunteer mentor under the guidance of the program facilitator and a horse co-facilitator.
- The client participates in a variety of activities with their horse partner (e.g. interacting with the horse to achieve a result such as moving in a specific direction without the aid of tools or props, observing herd behaviour and dynamics, long reining as part of a group).

PARDS Inclusive Programs

Little Pony Motricity

Little Pony Motricity is designed for ages 3 to 7 to a maximum 48" tall and 65 lbs. The program is set up with fun activities that incorporate fundamental skills in early ages of development through activities and engagement with their equine partners. Little Pony Motricity is both a ground work and riding program. Riders work in pairs with their pony partner to challenge obstacle courses and complete activities designed to create self learning and independence through play. The activities are proven to develop and enhance self-confidence, fine and gross motor ability, communication, concentration and attention span, understanding and application of instructions, discovery and development of body, space and time concepts, respect for others and animals and imagination. Benefits of this program are realized in children of all abilities.







Critter Connections

Critter Connections provides children and youth connection with a fun, compassionate and non-judgmental animal while they develop and strengthen their fundamental literacy skills. Participants build their reading skills by reading to their chosen animal partner whether it be pony, horse, donkey, goat or sheep. The program helps build their confidence in reading. They also play fun literacy developing games with their trusty animal partners. These games focus on letters, sounds, sight words, writing, combination sounds and much more! The participants also write a story about their animal partner throughout their session which they will take home at the end of their program further strengthening the human/animal bond they developed and reinforcing their learning.



Inclusive Youth Day Camp

Inclusive Youth Day Camp is open to children between the ages of 6 (as of January 1 of camp year) and 14, of all abilities.


Campers spend each day practicing and learning the basics of horse care and horsemanship through activities, lessons and hands-on learning. It's a fantastic way to learn the basics of horse care, riding, horsemanship, cart driving and much more. Youth Leadership activities are also incorporated into the daily camp schedule along with games, group activities and crafts. PARDS summer camps provide an inclusive environment where children and youth of all abilities are encouraged and supported to identify and build on their own strengths as well as recognize and appreciate the strengths of others.



PARDS Public Programs

P'tit Trot

P'tit Trot is an exciting program for children ages 5 years old and up, who love horses and want to learn more about the equestrian world. The P'tit Trot program is devoted solely to the initiation of equitation and general horsemanship, allowing children to discover the pleasures of English & Western disciplines as well as an introduction to developing proper knowledge on how to care for the horse. The P'tit Trot sessions are divided into 4 levels -Bronze, Silver, Gold, and Platinum with each chapter building on the previous skill set. This program is a fantastic stepping stone to beginner riding lessons.



Our Public Riding Lessons are for anyone aged 7 and older. The lessons are geared toward many skill levels, from riders with little or no experience with horses to more advanced novice riders. Lessons are facilitated by qualified instructors, and are designed to help riders become comfortable with riding basics enabling progress to an intermediate novice riding level. We run 3 - 10 week Public Riding Sessions that mirror the traditional school year. The programs are personalized to each rider's abilities, giving you the choice of participating in any or all of the three, 10-week sessions. Throughout your session, our goal is to help you progress, perfect your techniques and most importantly, have fun!





2022 Horse of the Year

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
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OUR CORE VALUES
