#### Treasurer's Report Where Do the Funds Come From? Total revenue is down 21% compared to 2022. This discrepancy is primarily due to the substantial capital grants received in the previous year for the construction of our hay shed and 3 bay garage, along with funds from our casino event through the AGLC. These funds amount to \$280,000 of additional revenue in 2022 that PARDS would not anticipate to receive in 2023.

In 2023, PARDS faced significant challenges due to severe drought conditions that adversely impacted the hay crop in our region. Due to limited supply, the cost of hay increased and led to increased expenses for purchasing and transporting hay from outside the region, compounded by the necessity of supplementing feed due to poor hay quality. These factors contributed to a rise in operational costs.

Amidst this challenge, we are pleased to report that, while donation revenue decreased by 25%, we experienced a 13% increase in fundraising revenue and a 25% increase in Board and Stable revenue, demonstrating our commitment to providing exceptional services and facilities that attract more members and users. Additionally, our annual Dine & Dance event set a new record by raising \$154,200 in 2023, surpassing last year's record of \$125,150, reflecting the continued support and generosity of our community.

As we move forward, we remain dedicated to finding sustainable solutions and optimizing our resources to mitigate the impact of external challenges while continuing to enhance our programs and services.

### Therapeutic Cart Driving Program



Alvin is a gentle man of few words but when we asked if we could write about him, he was very excited and eager to be involved. He expressed that he was honoured to be chosen and shared that years ago he was looking for a healthy recreational activity that was fun, social and helped him get exercise but felt his choices were limited given his interests and disabilities. This lead him to PARDS. Alvin was born with FASD which for him presents with characteristics of Pervasive Development Disorder. (PDD). When Alvin joined PARDS he was in a mounted riding program and has now transitioned to the cart driving program with his driving pony partner, Hot Wheels. Alvin's 6'2" frame dwarfs Hot Wheels but, even though there is much bending and

stooping on Alvin's part, he truly enjoys the hands on time he spends with Hot Wheels grooming and tacking. His gentleness and engagement forged a connection with Hot Wheels when on the ground but it was in the cart where this connection was truly cemented. Alvin's hand movements when manipulating the reins started out exaggerated and rough but through perseverance and determination Alvin learned to communicate with Hot Wheels with a gentle rein. Now driving independently with direction, Alvin gives Hot Wheels appropriate instructions using different pressure and lead directions on the reins to turn, halt and accelerate. To support Alvin to succeed in achieving his riding goals, he receives instruction in small steps with time given to process the instructions and to ensure understanding. One of Alvin's favourite things to do when cart driving is trot! His wide grin and intermittent bursts of laughter are evidence of the enjoyment he experiences in his lessons. His ever increasing engagement with Hot Wheels and the instructors show that he has also found the social interaction he was seeking. PARDS strives to provide a welcoming, safe environment and, according to Alvin, we have succeeded right along with him. We look forward to seeing Alvin continue to grow and develop his horsemanship skills and continue to have fun!


### Little Pony Motricity Inclusive Preschool Program



PARDS was excited to have partnered in 2023 for another year with the Aboriginal Headstart Program. 28 children between the ages of 3 and 5 from the Grande Prairie Friendship Centre joined us for 10 weeks in our Little Pony Motricity Program.

Each week, through fun activities, they learned about safety and basic leading and riding skills. They learned about horse care, grooming, and picking hooves. They also enjoyed the learning and engagement of the literacy focused activities. We can't thank retired kindergarten teacher Nancy Ingram enough for her help createing the fun, interactive literacy part of the day.

The Head Start Program's philosophy is: "Every child has the right to develop his or her full potential as a spiritual, emotional, social, and physical being. Our program strives to instill a sense of pride and a desire to learn, provide parenting skills, foster emotional and social development, increase confidence, and improve family relationships." PARDS is honoured the Friendship Headstart Program chose to include our program as a support for their program objectives.







### Therapeutic Riding Program



Desmond has been a longtime PARDS rider. He was first introduced to PARDS at the age of 8, when his school felt he would benefit from the therapeutic program, and from then, he was hooked. Once the school program ended, his parents saw how much pleasure he had when riding and being around the horses and so they signed him up into the program. Desmond has taken some breaks over the years, but the interest and benefits from his therapeutic riding lessons bring him back to PARDS Now 31 years old, Desmond returned for lessons in September. For Desmond's lessons he rides with a leader and 2 side walkers, ensuring he has a safe ride that allows him to feel at ease to concentrate on achieving his riding goals. Desmond is working on his balance and core strength along with some fundamental riding skills such as steering, by doing circles and going through different patterns. Desmond's favourite activity during riding is working on his halts and playing basketball on his horse! Desmond continues to come to PARDS because he loves the relationships he builds with the horses and instructors. Every time Desmond walks into the barn he with a huge smile on his face greets staff and volunteers throughout the barn.

Desmond and his family have been longtime supporters of PARDS, participating in our annual Fund Ride events and were involved in raising funds for our new facility. We look forward to seeing Desmond in the barn for years to come!

### Grooming / Horsemanship Program

The PARDS Grooming & Horsemanship program ensures everyone can participate in one of our therapeutic programs; Therapeutic riders who either choose, or are unable to participate in a mounted program, have a way of connecting with horses through the grooming/horsemanship program. Being able to properly groom a horse, as well as handling a horse on the ground, is essential to having a great bond with every horse we have at PARDS.

William was born with Cerebral Palsy, but due to seizures, is unable to participate in the mounted program. The option for the grooming/horsemanship program was discussed with William and he has been with Encana since, and they have formed a beautiful bond. William grew up around horses and wanted to be around them again. From getting covered in hair from deshedding picking Encana's hooves, learning to tack, to learning proper arena etiquette and leading techniques, William excels.

When I first met William, we focused on being comfortable around Encana through grooming. We also utilized Pinocchio, our therapeutic mechanical horse we use during assessments for new riders, Being able to utilize Pinocchio helped William strengthen his core as well as work on isolating different muscles to improve his mobility. After teaching William important mobility exercises, we moved on to horsemanship with Encana. The groundwork giave William exercises for improving strength and a different way to connect as a team with Encana. William makes the most of every lesson and is always willing to try and learn new things through the program.

### Therapeutic Riding Program

Lyle has been riding at PARDS since 2005. He was born with a developmental delay and a cleft palate, which makes articulation challenging. Lyle has been, in addition to PARDS, involved in other athletic pursuits as well as PARDS. He represented Grande Prairie at the Special Olympics Championships in London, Ontario as a member of the bowling team.

Lyle has developed good balance, a deep seat in the saddle and gentle, firm manners when reining. Vala is13th horse he has ridden over his years at PARDS, and she is his new favourite since Molson, but that is only because Molson retired. Lyle is always positive and smiling when he rides. Each horse has different skill sets, enabling lesson horses to be chosen for specific areas of riding skills or the physical needs of a rider. Lyle's time at PARDS also gives him a place where he feels welcome and well received. He often comes early to his lesson to talk to staff.

Lyle has worked at the bottle depot for many years picking up recycling around the Grande Prairie area

and values being a part of the workforce. He took a break from work recently and went to Cuba where he sampled Cuban dark rum, ate the "best food" and got to ride a camel. Lyle's riding lessons at PARDS may have helped him enjoy his ride even more through gained confidence, balance and knowledge. He said the camel bowed down low to the ground for him to mount, then stood up quickly and made him taller than any PARDS horse. He laughed and said, "Now if we could just teach PARDS horses to bow down to get on."

We are so happy that Lyle enjoys his time at PARDS and we are looking forward to watching him flourish!

### Youth Leadership Program

Many youth today share that they feel like, they never quite fit in anywhere. Youth are referred to the Youth Leadership Program to help develop coping skills and strategies around their struggles to form social relationships with peers. Some youth are in a constant state of worry and low self-esteem.

One youth ('Abby') came to the program and has a good heart, adores all animals and fell in love with horses after her first lesson at PARDS. After the barn tour, the group participated in an exercise of interacting with various herd members in an effort to find an equine partner for that evening's lesson. One of our herd, Freckles, who can be quite impatient when separated from the other horses and vocalizes her disapproval loudly and constantly, caught Abby's attention. As she called out for her friends and pranced around while tied in the alley, Abby watched very closely. The other kids in the group flocked to the mini pony and other large black horse standing calmly farther down the alleyway, making comments why they didn't want to work with the loud horse. (Freckles)

After a few moments, Abby walked over and patiently waited for Freckles to acknowledge her presence. Freckles sniffed at her and stood very still, eyes wide and very unsure of the young girl watching her. As Abby started to brush Freckles, she noticed her starting to calm down, relax, and focus on the grooming session and not the other horses. Abby described Freckles demeanor as "like she feels accepted and isn't afraid of being alone". After a few minutes, the rest of the group noticed that t/freckles had quieted and the horse was settled with Abby still grooming. The rest of the group slowly joined Abby with one youth asking her how she got Freckles to settle down. Abby replied, "I just quietly spoke to her and gave her some space while watching, letting her know she wasn't alone".

Since starting the Youth Leadership Program, Abby has found a place to belong. She has found an interest to pursue with pride in what she is capable of. She has overcome so many fears and since attending PARDS Youth Leadership program she has learned strategies to help her continue to conquer even more.

Observable changes in behaviour over the time Abby has participated in the program include a significant reduction in negative self-talk, a notable increase in the confidence she displays, and every week when she arrives, she is more and more comfortable with her surroundings. The people she has gotten to know, she now considers as friends to look to for support, instead of strangers to look at with fear. This is the greatest gift of the Youth Leadership Program. Abby may not "fit" in with the rest of her part of the world, but at PARDS she has found acceptance and the confidence to believe that safe places do exist. It is the hope that the strategies learned and the acceptance Abby has found can carry into her day to day life in her world outside of PARDS.

### Unbridled Program

I was approached by PARDS in the spring of 2023 about facilitating an Animal Assisted Therapy program for youth and adults. I was incredibly honored and excited to enter into this unique partnership as I have always been a firm believer in the healing power of animals. Growing up on a farm, I was able to experience first-hand the therapeutic nature of the bond between human and animal. Although challenging at times, I support this program in addition to operating a full-time private practice because I recognize that this is a much-needed program in our community and it is my hope to see the program continue to grow.

Research has shown that Animal Assisted Therapy (AAT) has many benefits, especially for those who struggle to trust other humans as a result of trauma, anxiety, etc. Clients typically find it much easier to connect to an animal as it allows them to experience an unconditional relationship. Large animals, such as horses, present a unique opportunity where individuals must be mentally and emotionally present. Interacting with horses (and other animals) has been proven to decrease heart rate, blood pressure, and stress, as well as cause the release of oxytocin, which reduces anxiety and depression, while creating a sense of happiness.

Mindfulness, emotional regulation, relationship building, and confidence building are at the heart of each session. Sessions are tailored to the needs and goals of each individual client and talk therapy may be the primary or secondary modality utilized during sessions. Sessions primarily involve ground work activities with a horse and include:

**Observing** (inner and outer experience)

Mindfulness, emotional regulation, body awareness

Grooming

Mindfulness, emotional regulation, stress reduction, sensory, relationship building, self-esteem building **Leading** 

Confidence building, relationship building, decision making, boundaries

The program launched in October, 2023. We began with 2 adults and 1 minor with a total of 17 sessions. Interest has grown quickly, and we currently have a growing waitlist for new registrants. So far in 2024, we have provided a total of 24 sessions to 5 adults and 2 minors. Clients have returned for multiple sessions and have shared the following experiences and observations:

- Feeling connected and understood
- Working with the horses has been the first time they have felt 'in the moment' and 'present'
- Just watching the horses allowed them to feel a sense of calm and they were able to take a break from life's many stressors
- During their time with the horses, they are able to notice the world around them rather than feeling like they are in a 'fog'
- Feeling motivated and inspired to make productive changes in their life
- Feeling motivated to go home and accomplish tasks they had been putting off
- Feeling more aware of their emotions and how this impacts relationships
- It is easier to talk and share difficult stories with a horse
- Noticeable improvements in their confidence
- A noticeable decrease in anxiety levels by the end of session
- Able to draw parallels between work done in session and their day to day life

### PARDS Therapeutic Programs

Each client that comes to PARDS first goes through an assessment process. We establish goals, go over any other therapy they may be undergoing, establish the physical, emotional or cognitive challenges they face and work out which horse would be best suited. To their needs. If it turns out that a client shouldn't ride for health reasons, we work diligently to find an alternative program.

#### **Therapeutic Riding**

Therapeutic riding is offered to clients aged 3 and up. Clients who participate in riding lessons must have a clinical diagnosis. Our therapeutic client base encompasses a wide spectrum of disabilities classified under the scope of Physical (includes riders with limited mobility, delayed fine and gross motor skills, low trunk control/core strength, undeveloped balance, etc.), Cognitive (includes riders with limited cognitive capacity, autism spectrum disorders, traumatic brain injury, etc.), Sensory (includes riders with visual, auditory or speech impairment) and Nonvisible (includes riders with learning disability, epilepsy/seizure disorder, ADD/ADHD, anxiety, a variety of psychological disorders, etc.).



#### **Therapeutic Cart Driving**

Not everyone can ride – or wants to – but cart driving is another excellent way to access the benefits of equine therapy. Learning to work with and control a horse as the driver of a cart brings many therapeutic benefits, similar to the ones for therapeutic riding. Cart driving is where a horse or pony is hitched to a wheeled cart and is driven around an arena, an obstacle course, or out on a trail. Driving is a fabulous opportunity to make new friends, gain a sense of independence, be out in the open air (weather permitting) and have fun! Cart driving can range from a relaxing ride around our indoor arena or out on our specially designated cart trail, to thrilling PARA Equestrian competitions run by Equine Canada.



#### **Therapeutic Grooming & Horsemanship**

We offer several programs to clients who cannot take part in horseback riding due to a disability that has a contraindication to riding of any sort. They are also offered to clients who are looking for a different or additional challenge. Grooming offers participants the chance to develop a relationship with a horse, learn horse care skills and benefit physically, psychologically and educationally. The benefits are actually quite similar to those of therapeutic riding with the most important being the positive impacts of the human/animal bond.



#### **Youth Leadership**

Youth Leadership is a ground work experiential learning program focusing on cooperation, relationship building, self-esteem and more. It's learning, without realizing you're learning.

- The youth works directly with a horse partner and a volunteer mentor under the guidance of the program facilitator and a horse co-facilitator.
- The youth participates in a variety of activities with their horse partner (e.g. interacting with the horse to achieve a result such as moving in a specific direction without the aid of tools or props, observing herd behaviour and dynamics, long reining as part of a group).

As co-facilitators, the horses guide and support. It's all about choices. That's our ultimate goal: having participants make the choices and evaluate those choices in the end.





### PARDS Inclusive Programs

#### **Little Pony Motricity**

Little Pony Motricity is designed for ages 3 to 7 to a maximum 48" tall and 65 lbs. The program is set up with fun activities that incorporate fundamental skills in early ages of development through activities and engagement with their equine partners. Little Pony Motricity is both a ground work and riding program. Riders work in pairs with their pony partner to challenge obstacle courses and complete activities designed to create self learning and independence through play. The activities are proven to develop and enhance self-confidence, fine and gross motor ability, communication, concentration and attention span, understanding and application of instructions, discovery and development of body, space and time concepts, respect for others, animals, and imagination. Benefits of this program are realized in children of all abilities.



#### **Inclusive Youth Day Camp**

Inclusive Youth Day Camp is open to children between the ages of 6 (as of January 1 of camp year) and 14, of all abilities. Campers spend each day practicing and learning the basics of horse care and horsemanship through activities, lessons and hands-on learning. It's a fantastic way to learn the basics of horse care, riding, horsemanship, cart driving and much more. Youth Leadership activities are incorporated into the daily camp schedule along with games, group activities and crafts. PARDS summer camps provide an inclusive environment where children and youth of all abilities are encouraged and supported to identify and build on their own strengths as well as recognize and appreciate the strengths of others.



### PARDS Public Programs

#### P'Trot

<u>P'tit Trot</u> is an exciting program for children ages 5 years old and up, who love horses and want to learn more about the equestrian world. The P'tit Trot program is devoted solely to the initiation of equitation and general horsemanship, allowing children to discover the pleasures of English & Western disciplines as well as an introduction to developing proper knowledge on how to care for a horse. The P'tit Trot sessions are divided into 4 levels – Bronze, Silver, Gold, and Platinum with each chapter building on the previous skill set. This program is a fantastic stepping stone to beginner riding lessons.



#### **Public Riding Lessons**

Our Public Riding Lessons are for anyone aged 7 and older. The lessons are geared toward many skill levels, from riders with little or no experience with horses to more advanced novice riders. Lessons are facilitated by qualified instructors, and are designed to help riders become comfortable with riding basics enabling progress to an intermediate novice riding level. We run 3 – 10 week Public Riding Sessions that mirror the traditional school year. The programs are personalized to each rider's abilities, giving riders the choice of participating in any or all of the three, 10-week sessions. Our goal, in every session is to help riders progress, perfect their techniques and most importantly, have fun!





### 2023 Horse of the Year



**Risley** was born in 2002, making him 22 years old and stands at a whopping 14.2 HH. He has been a beloved member of the PARDS herd since 2013. Before he started at PARDS, Risley spent many summers trail riding in the mountains. In his early years at PARDS he was used as a lesson pony. A young rider with Congenital Dislocation of the hip may benefit from riding Risley; his broad back puts the rider in a riding position with their legs far apart, which reproduces the wide leg position of the brace. The gentle rocking motion of his walk can help strengthen muscles which stabilize the hip joint. Even though his stature is small, he makes up for it with his heart. His soft eyes and soft coat are the perfect complement to his easy going

personality. A Morgan and Quarter Horse cross, his gentle and level headed disposition has now made him a favourite among both therapeutic and public riders. He is one of our 'Steady Heady' horses, which makes him a perfect match for any rider in the program, whether that be young or old, new to riding or more experienced.

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A fabulous night was had by all. Event attendees enjoyed a Champagne welcome, a delicious dinner catered by Five Mile Hall & Catering and attendees kicked their feet up on the dance floor, with live music by TJ RUCKUS.

Throughout the evening there was a silent auction, raffles and live auction excitement with auctioneer Dave Neale and his boys.

### PARDS Summer Camps

Youth Day Camp is open to children between the ages of 6 and 14, of all abilities. Campers spend each day practicing and learning the basics of horse care and horsemanship through activities, lessons and hands-on learning. Youth Leadership activities are also incorporated into the daily camp schedule along with games, group activities and crafts.
